

ANZAC Day

Marine Rescue NSW volunteers may represent the organisation at ANZAC Day commemorations, including dawn services, marches, memorial services and wreath laying ceremonies.

Members attending in an official capacity should wear approved Marine Rescue uniform appropriate to the event. Working Blues (1B) are the standard dress, with Dress Whites (2D) permitted where appropriate. A poppy or sprig of rosemary may be worn as a mark of remembrance.

Full-size medals are to be worn. Medals awarded to the wearer are worn on the left side of the chest, with medals worn in honour of relatives on the right. Unofficial or commemorative medals must not be worn.

Members may be required to participate in marches, wreath laying or other ceremonial elements as part of official proceedings and should follow directions from event organisers.

Marine Rescue bases should fly the Australian National Flag at half-mast from first light until midday, before raising it to full mast at midday.

Where participating in coastal or maritime commemorations, Marine Rescue vessels may take part in ceremonial activities on the water, including vessel formations, ceremonial horn sounding, or the casting of floral tributes where appropriate.
